

## PLAYER INJURY MANAGEMENT POLICY

September 2017

## General

- For the safety of an injured player, the referee may stop the game
- With the referee's permission, the player may leave the water for a three-minute injury timeout. The game is suspended during this time
- If an injured player wishes to submit an injury claim to the WPA insurer, the insurer will
  require a written report of the incident, and may require any medical reports pertaining to the
  injury.

## **Melbourne Sports and Aquatic Centre (MSAC)**

- At MSAC, pool life-guards are the primary first responders for any medical emergency and injured player
- Referees are **not primarily responsible** for treating the injured player
- Referees are to note the incident details on the game sheet including Player WPV ID (number)
- Details to include a summary of the incident and the nature of the injuries on the game sheet
- MSAC staff will complete an incident report which WPV can access if required

## **Melbourne High School Pool**

WPV is aware that Melbourne High does not have the same support mechanisms in place, especially during after-school activity.

- There is an automated external defibrillator (AED) and a first aid kit onsite
- Referees and pool controllers are the <u>primary response</u> for treating the injured player
- Referees are to note the incident details on the game sheet including Player WPV ID (number)
- Details to include a summary of the incident and the nature of the injuries on the game sheet
- Pool controllers and referees should make themselves familiar with the AED and the contents
  of the first aid kit
